# ABOUT NUS INITIATIVE TO IMPROVE HEALTH IN ASIA (NIHA)

NIHA, an integrative initiative set up in 2010 to improve public health and healthcare delivery in Asia, was made possible with a funding of \$\$17 million over 10 years from the GSK-EDB Trust Fund, which was established as part of the GSK-Singapore 10-year Strategic Roadmap. NIHA focuses on three key areas — research, high-level policy forums and leadership programmes. NIHA is coordinated by the NUS-GAI, in collaboration with the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, the Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine, and the NUS Business School.

#### NIHA has two key objectives:

- make a contribution to thinking and policy-formulation in public health and health systems development in Asia
- elevate Singapore to a leading position in healthcare policy and related research.

The cutting-edge Research and Forums in health policy will provide greater insights that have been used to develop the Leadership Programme. The Leadership Programme has trained a talented pool of professionals in the field and enhanced the capabilities and competencies of regulators and healthcare policymakers.



## NIHA POLICY FORUM

NIHA organises annual high-level Forums on health policy. In November 2010, NIHA hosted the inaugural Forum which was attended by over 70 participants, including Director-Generals of health or their representatives from 10 Asian countries. At this Forum, the first 5-year Medium Term Research Agenda for NIHA was discussed and finalized by the International Advisory Board using participant inputs from the proceedings of the two days.

In 2011, the NIHA Forum will focus on "Combating Chronic Disease in Asia – Gaps and Innovations". The Forum aims to:

- Identify most critical public health issues in Asia
- Share highly innovative approaches and solutions
- Define key gaps in research that would inform policy and action

The Forum will bring together Directors of Health in the region, Healthcare Policy Academics, NGO representatives, and Industry persons so as to foster partnerships among key policy makers in Asian governments.

## NIHA RESEARCH GRANTS

NIHA aims to facilitate collaborative policy research by experts in the healthcare field. The programme will integrate and leverage on the full range of expertise within and outside NUS.

The first call for proposals was announced in January 2011 where a total of 61 proposals were received. The proposals represented 17 countries from around the world and covered 15 public health topics. Each proposal underwent a rigorous review process – first, by a panel of three esteemed NUS faculty, then by the NIHA International Advisory Board. After which, 19 proposals were shortlisted to be presented at a research workshop held on 21-22 June 2011 where they were evaluated by a panel of experts based on the following criteria:-

- multidisciplinary nature which addressed medical, economic, social, and ethical issues that influenced the way healthcare is organised, financed, managed, and delivered
- major health challenges relevant to Asia with regional orientation and application
- contribution towards policy formulation

Finally, a total of 11 research proposals were successfully awarded.

## NIHA LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME

The NIHA Leadership Programme (LP) aims to enhance leadership acumen and decision making abilities amongst leaders in the health sector. Participants learn about health policy and program design, implementation and evaluation, and healthcare leadership and management. The LP is a first-of-its-kind, with Asia-centric case studies and faculty. A distinct and unique programme, it blends traditional teaching methods with case studies learning and site visits. All participants get a chance to work with a faculty mentor on a practical project. The LP targets emerging leaders from government, civil service, and civil society who contribute to health policy and health services delivery in Asia.

For the October 2011 batch, the composition of participants was about 50% senior policy makers and public healthcare leaders from 11 countries in Asia, 25% leaders from non-government organisations and 25% private sector leaders from pharmacy, health delivery systems and equipment from Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, Lao PDR, China,

Thailand, Hong Kong, Myanmar, Philippines, Vietnam, India, Bangladesh, Malaysia and Singapore. Besides various multidisciplinary faculty schools at NUS and the RAND Corporation, the faculty included David Heymann - Chairman of the Board of the UK Health Protection Agency (HPA), Patricia Moser of the Asian Development Bank, Professor Chia Kee Seng, Dean of the Saw Swee Hock School of Public Health; Mr Loke Wai Chiong, Managing Director of Health at KPMG Services Pte Ltd, and Jack Sim, the founder of the World Toilet Organisation. The key themes addressed in the Leadership Program were: leadership and change, healthcare decision making, program and policy implementation and stakeholder management.
